

Bumper Pool Table Sizes

Rectangle and octagon, the cloth and the room each needs

ROOM FORMULA
Room = cloth + two cue lengths in each direction, the same rule as a pool table. Bumper pool cues are short -- 48 in is standard, 42 in for tight rooms -- so a 54 x 30 in table needs 12 x 10 ft with 48-in cues and 11 x 9 ft with 42-in cues. An octagon is the same in both directions: about 11 1/2 ft square.

CLOTH TO SCALE (rectangles nested from one corner; octagons nested at the centre)



Rectangle or octagon? Rectangles bank longer and are the classic coin-op table; octagons fit a poker or dining top and play faster. Same rules on both.
Sizes are typical: bumper pool has no governing body, so measure the cloth before ordering a cover, felt or a cue rack to fit.
