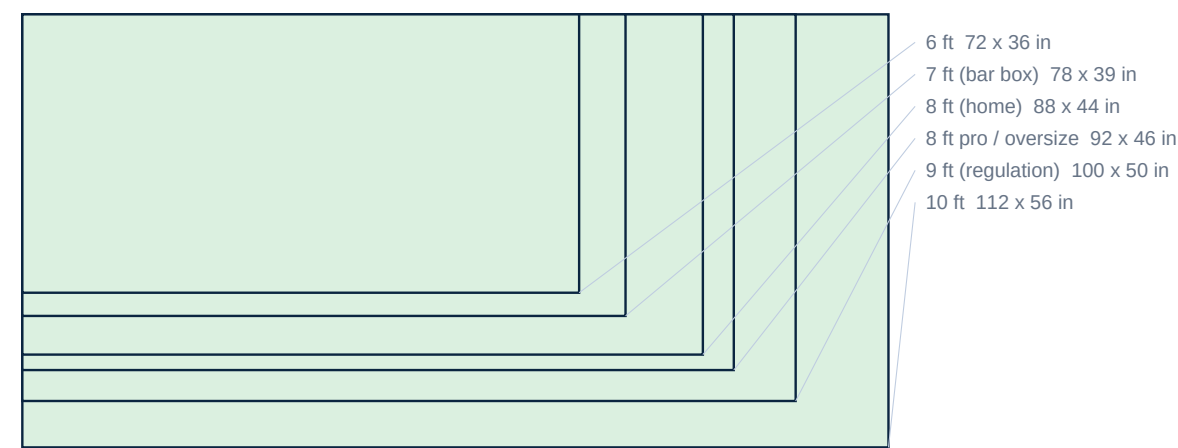


Pool Table Sizes

6 to 10 ft -- playing surface, overall size and the room each needs

PLAYING SURFACES TO SCALE (nested, shared corner)



Room = playing surface + two cue lengths in each direction; add a few inches so the butt of the cue clears the wall.
58 in is a standard cue; 52 and 48 in shorties rescue a tight wall
Overall size varies with the rail and cabinet -- about 15 in more than the playing surface each way is typical.
Measure a specific table before buying
